- 4. Read 1 Corinthians 13:4-8. How would your life and relationships be different if you could love like that?
- 5. Dr. John Gottman said the definition of trust is built in very small moments. That every interaction is a chance to build connection or turn away. Do you agree or disagree? Why?
- 6. What "Marble Jar Moment" can you choose this week? Say thank you? Leave a love note? Go to dinner and simply listen? Empathize or show compassion towards? Apologize for gossiping? Give a hug? These "Marble Jar Moments" are the very moments that build trust and make adulting better. How can this group encourage you?
